MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN AND **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

A few weeks ago, members of our Board of Directors were reviewing the 2022 successes and challenges. It was an interesting discussion about permanency, a word we use a lot in CASA to talk about the outcome of a child's juvenile court case. Was the child able to return home, reunified with his or her family? If reunification with his or her family was not possible, was the child adopted into another family, or placed in a guardianship with caregivers? These are all considered successful outcomes, permanency, for a child who has experienced foster care.

Successes in child welfare, though, are not so easily defined. We know the outcome of a court case is not the lone indicator; sometimes those little victories along the way have a greater impact on the child as he or she grows in years and independence.

With gratitude, we celebrate 105 CASA Volunteers who have chosen to make child advocacy a priority in their lives. Our Volunteers cultivate relationships with children who are experiencing foster care; engage in important conversations with biological and foster parents; advocate for needed services for children and families in the school and community; and make recommendations to the Juvenile Court Judge in the best interest of the child. All these things, and many more, make a huge difference in the lives and futures of our children and give children the best opportunity to thrive.

Flip through the pages to see a snapshot of those who have helped us change the stories for children and families. Whether as a volunteer or a financial supporter, your gift to our children is added to others' gifts to make a tremendous difference for our communities.

Pediatric neurosurgeon and author Dr. Fred Epstein asserted, "The question, 'Why do children suffer?" has no answer, unless it's simply, 'To break our hearts.' Once our hearts get broken, they never fully heal. They always ache. But perhaps a broken heart is a more loving instrument. Perhaps only after our hearts have cracked wide open, have finally and totally unclenched, can we truly know love without boundaries."

COMMUNITY COLLABORATION THROUGH OUR CAT (CLOTHING AND TOY) CENTER

Throughout the year, community members, civic groups and businesses donate items to our CAT Center to ensure our kids have what they need particularly school supplies and holiday toys. During the summer, generous donations provided school supplies for 122 children experiencing foster care. During December, the toy drive gave our volunteers the chance to "shop" for the kids they serve, providing toys and gifts for 175 children, ranging in age from two weeks old to college students.

CELEBRATING SUCCESSES



THE POWER OF PRESENCE

Just before the Thanksgiving holiday, Christopher received some tough news from his attorney. After a year moving between several foster homes and now living in a group home, Christopher's parents surrendered their parental rights. Knowing the meeting between attorney and youth was happening, the CASA Volunteer planned a visit to see Christopher shortly afterward. He was crushed, and had so many questions: "What will happen to me? Will I ever have a family?" Christopher's CASA listened, and assured him that while she did not have all the answers, what she did know is this: She is his CASA and she would be there for him to advocate for him and help him navigate the next steps, whatever those would be. Her presence, and her promise was the assurance he needed that day, and in the days ahead.

CONNECTIONS MATTER

Advocate is both a noun and a verb. Part of the advocacy work for one CASA Volunteer included helping to mediate the relationship between the youth and her grandmother. She made best interest recommendations for the child to be placed with a family friend, who would work to maintain family relationships as the youth's parents worked toward reunifying the family.

RELENTLESS ADVOCACY

It is impossible to overestimate the severity of the affordable housing shortage – especially for disadvantaged families in our area. This is often the final and most cruel barrier to our parents completing their case plans to bring their children home. We are so grateful for the creative and relentless work of our CASA Volunteers, who have helped locate funding sources and resources for families who just need that last boost for the family to be restored, and the encouragement given to parents to continue in the journey.

With great sadness, we mourn the loss of Linda Wagner. Linda was what we affectionately called a "triple threat" for our CASA program. Serving on the Board of Directors since 2011, she was also a CASA Volunteer, and served as a leader in our Women Working Wonders program. She truly lived her values – she believed every

child deserves a safe, loving and permanent home, and was quick to tell the story of CASA and connect people to CASA in meaningful ways. She was an Advocate for our children, and she was often found behind the scenes gathering auction items for fundraisers, bringing food for our training classes and offering encouragement for our team.

Linda was all heart and gave so much of her time, her talent and her gifts to benefit the kids we serve and the program she loved so well. She believed everyone has the capacity to make a difference and she modeled this for us in so many ways. The warmth of her smile, the laughter that typically entered a room with her and her fierce advocacy for children is sorely missed by so many.

INSPIRING SUCCESS

When a youth experiences foster care, safety and risk are the primary concerns addressed. It is often the CASA Volunteer who brings the child's overall well-being to the forefront. How can we support the youth in his or her education? How can we support the youth in their ability to participate in extracurricular activities in the school and in the community? When Lily qualified to compete in a regional DECA competition, it was the CASA Volunteer linking her need for professional clothing to our Women Working Wonders, who were able to meet this need. Lily competed with a boost of confidence.

WOMEN WORKING Wonders

Women Working Wonders (WWW) is a group of dynamic women focused on improving the lives of children experiencing foster care because of abuse or neglect. WWW supports the work of Hall-Dawson CASA by sharing our story with their families, friends and business associates, and their \$100 annual dues fill the gap for our kids where there are no other resources available. Started in 2010, many WWW members have a long association with CASA. They have a renewed goal of having 100 active members.
